A BIT OF HISTORY

Sundance Saloon was formed eight years ago by a group of individuals who decided it was time for San Francisco to have a place to two-step where everyone was welcome. From the start it has been an all-volunteer project, a labor of love produced for the community by the community.

Sundance Saloon opened its doors on April 12, 1998, at its old King Street location. By the following year, the Sundance Association for Country-Western Dancing received its 501c3 nonprofit status, based on its educational and cultural mission.

Over the years the weekly Sundance Saloon has served thousands of members of the LGBT community. Along the way, we moved to a new location, built two dance floors with our own sweat and love, held numerous special events, and watched the growth of our community. We saw our Sundance Stompede country-western dance weekend receive international acclaim, extended our

reach to community events like San Francisco Pride and the Castro Street Fair, and raised over \$70,000 for other nonprofit organizations. We're proud of our history, and look forward to our future.

Also, whether you are new or old at Sundance Saloon, take some time to remember the rules of etiquette (see the back page).



DANCE FLOOR ETIQUETTE

Following dance floor etiquette helps everyone to have fun. The rules are simple enough, but it helps if everyone is aware of them. Basically, all you have to do is be courteous and respectful of those around you.

If you are not dancing, don't stand on the dance floor. Stand close to the wall so we don't experience the incredible shrinking dance floor. Also, don't carry drinks onto the dance floor. Report spills immediately.

Dance in a counterclockwise direction around the floor. Don't back up, but if you have to for some reason, be sure to look behind you first.

Leaders - look where you are going, and be prepared for the unexpected (like the couple in front of you who didn't look before they backed up). Leaders are responsible for protecting their partners. (Remember, it's always the leader's fault.)

Slower dancers should move towards the inside of the dance floor, allowing faster dancers to pass them on the outside. Don't tailgate another couple, but don't dawdle either (and definitely don't stop!). If the floor is crowded and there's a large space between you and the couple in front, either move to the inside, or speed up to close the gap, or everyone will start to back up behind you. Faster dancers should not move faster than they can safely go.

If you are doing West or East Coast Swing, leave room on the outside of the dance floor for other dancers. Many would-be shadow-dancers, shufflers, and two-steppers are otherwise unable to navigate the dance floor during these dances.

If you bump into someone, smile and apologize. If someone bumps into you, smile and apologize. If you find yourself apologizing all the time, maybe the problem isn't just "everybody else." If you find yourself smiling all the time, well, good.

Finally, there is no excuse for "road rage" on the dance floor. If you see someone breaking the rules, let it go. Maybe he isn't aware of the rules, maybe she's trying her best, but it's unlikely he really is a jerk who simply enjoys getting in your way. We all make mistakes. Getting angry isn't going to solve anything. Smile, and apologize.

5, 6 Step L forward, pivot ½-turn to the right (shift weight to R)

7, 8 Rock L forward, recover R in place

9&10 Shuffle back L, R, L with ½-turn to the left 11, 12 Rock R forward, recover L in place

13&14 Shuffle back R, L, R with ½-turn to the right

15, 16 Rock L forward, recover R in place

&17 Swing L out in circular motion, step L behind R
&18 Swing R out in circular motion, step R behind L
&19 Swing L out in circular motion, step L behind R

&20 Step R together, step L forward
21, 22 Step R forward, lock L behind R
(23)&24 (Hold), clap, clap (shift weight to L)

&25 Swing R out in circular motion with $\frac{1}{4}$ -turn right, step R behind L

&26 Step L together, step R forward

27, 28 Step L forward, pivot ½-turn to the right (shift weight to R)

29 Turn ¼ right and step L to the left &30 Cross R behind L, step L to the left

31&32 Kick R forward, step R together, cross L over R
